Minutes from the June 6 all-member meeting

ERS President Dave Baine called the virtual meeting to order at 12 p.m.

June Guest Speaker:

Brian Le with NY Life presented reasons we may want to have longterm care insurance. Medicare doesn't cover long-term care in most cases, though in some cases, it covers up to 100 days of care. Relying on Medicaid coverage isn't available to those with income or assets above a low threshold. Most people prefer to stay in their own home as they age. Having adequate financial resources could make the difference whether it's possible. There are many options when considering insurance. Some require underwriting and a medical exam for eligibility. **AARP.org** has some great resources to help.

Secretary's Report: *Jessica* Bonebright's March 7 membership meeting minutes were approved as published.

President's Report: Dave Baine reported ERS meetings will be virtual while SPEEA's meeting room technology is being upgraded, probably through the end of the year. The annual ERS financial review has been completed. ERS filing with the Washington secretary of state was also completed. Insurance, pension and health care chairs are open. They are jobs that don't take a lot of work.

Message from Bill Kadereit, NRLN President

More companies are doing "de-risking" (Pension Risk Transfer) of their pension plans by purchasing alternative retiree annuities from third party insurance companies. This strips retirees of federal law pension protections. Foremost among protections that the NRLN wants to become law is our statute proposal that such an annuity contract must include full reinsurance of monthly benefit payments. A group annuity contract that requires independent, third-party reinsurance with a highly rated insurance company can protect pension plan participants from the pension risk that has been shifted to them.

Social Security and Medicare would be on the chopping block if House "fiscal commission" bills are passed. The NRLN opposes such commissions that would meet behind closed doors to create its cost-cutting recommendations to be "fast tracked" with no amendments in the House or Senate, and only yes or no votes.

The NRLN is against the harm to seniors that a House Study Committee's Fiscal Year 2025 budget proposal would do to Social Security and Medicare by: Cutting over \$1.5 trillion from Social Security.

Increasing the retirement age to 69 from the current age 67 which is a reduction in lifetime benefits. Many are not physically able to work until age 69 to receive full benefits.

Raising Medicare costs by stopping Medicare from negotiating prescription drug prices, repealing \$35 insulin and preventing Medicare's \$2,000 out-of-pocket cap on prescription drugs beginning in 2025.

Transitioning Medicare to a **premium support system** that the Congressional Budget Office has found would raise premiums for many seniors.

The NRLN continues to lobby members of Congress against high costs of health care shifted to retirees and the complicated unfairness of the chronic illness-subsidized benefits that are being denied to 27 million original Medicare Parts A and B participants. NRLN's proposal equalizes chronic benefits for all over age 65.

The NRLN wants legislation to end pay-for-delay and other brand-name drugmakers' tactics that keep generic drugs off the market. We support bills to allow Americans to import prescription drugs from Canada.
